RESOLUTION NO. 01-2021: This resolution calls upon the Temple Student Government executive branch to propose that Temple University enact a Tuition Freeze for the 2021-2022 school year for in- and out-of- state undergraduate and graduate students.

Currently, Temple's Board of Trustees has not approved a tuition freeze for the 2021-2022 academic year.

Knowing, The Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education has voted to freeze basic in-state tuition for the 2021-2022 school year.

Knowing, The Temple University Board of Trustees approved a tuition freeze for the 2020-2021 school year, a year impacted by the COVID-19 Pandemic.

Understanding, That the ongoing COVID-19 Pandemic has caused significant economic hardship for college students

Understanding, That increasing tuition may negatively impact the wellbeing of students at Temple

Understanding, that President Englert has stated "With the economy in its current state, we could not in good conscience propose an increase in Temple's tuition... Students have had to face many challenges in recent months. A tuition increase should not be one of them."

OPERATIVE- CLAUSE, Temple Student Government's Executive Branch should immediately begin the process to present this proposal to Temple's Board of Trustees

Universities within the State System include: Bloomsburg, California, Cheyney, Clarion, East Stroudsburg, Edinboro, Indiana, Kutztown, Lock Haven, Mansfield, Millersville, Shippensburg, Slippery Rock and West Chester universities of Pennsylvania.

As stated by Cindy Shapira, the chair of the Board of Governors, "A quality education and an affordable one go hand-in-hand at our universities. President Marty Meehan, President of the University of Massachusetts, told the Board of Trustees before the vote "Our goal is to ease the financial burden of our students and families, many of whom have suffered from job losses, business closures and other impacts of COVID-19 crisis."

The USNH has decided to freeze tuition for in-state students for the 2021-2022 academic year. As stated by Cathy Provencher, USNH Vice Chancellor, "This has been an incredibly challenging year in so many ways, and we continue to work to lessen the financial burden on our students and their families, many of whom have suffered job losses, business closures and other impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic."

An article published in the Journal of Urban Health investigated the impact of COVID-19 on college student financial and mental wellbeing. The authors conducted a cross-sectional study of City University of New York (CUNY) students.

Researchers found that 81.1% of students reported that they or someone in their household lost income as a result of COVID-19. Furthermore, 47.8% of students reported an increase in household spending as a result of COVID-19. Half of students reported that feeling very or somewhat worried that they would lose housing as a result of the pandemic, nearly half of students reported experiencing food instability, and 85% of students reported a reduced ability to purchase food.
